Making portfolios for my personal projects gives me the opportunity to practice layout and design ideas.


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
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




Even my dolls have a sewing machine.


A bunting machine




















The final product. Installed in April 2021.

Once there was only a conception of bunting + triangles = pizza. Now there is a decoration and a piece of craft work I can be satisfied with.










What's next in bunting?


This project has gone in a dangerous direction with the seasonal slant. I have bunting for Christmas and Halloween, and also for Autumn.

It would be nice to have all four seasons. As one bunting comes down the next goes up. After all the cuphooks are already there.















How to make bunting

Feeling inspired? Here's how to make your own bunting.

Bunting is essentially triangles. I cut out triangles that are 10cm across the top and 15cm at the apex of the point. You can cut out a lot of triangles from a single piece of fabric.

You don't want your bunting to fray, so either cut with crimping scissors, or hem to a backing piece. For my autumn bunting I did both.

Backing fabric is useful for structure, for aesthetics and to assist your concept. My autumn bunting is all backed with orange, my sugar skull fabric triangles with black, my Christmas bunting is double sided. The muslin triangles in the sugar skull string are single pieces, crimp cut.

Bunting is sewn on to strips of binding fabric. You can use ribbon but it's not very strong.

I sewed different coloured ribbons for my autumn bunting on to a green binding, because I had only short sections of ribbon. That made for a messy job and I still have a lot of loose threads to cut off. I also made one miniature doll-size bunting using a section of braided ribbon from a chocolate box, which came out beautifully.



Design concepts

For great bunting you need a theme. Christmas is an obvious one (for those who celebrate it) but you might feel some pressure for your holiday bunting to be extra neat. Autumn is a great beginner project. I made mine out of scraps and it came out kind of raggedy and I think that's on theme for autumn.

Pizza was an amazing theme and I spent a lot of time achieving the effect I wanted. It involved handsewing the thicker stuffed-crust pieces and the toppings.

My idea for watermelon involves a mixture of gauze and heavier fabric so that will take some time to work out. Sketching out and mocking up some pieces gives you an idea of how they will look and work together.

You don't have to do whole rooms at a time. Start with a little piece of empty wall, and measure the width. Your bunting binding should be at least half again as long to make some graceful curves when you hang it.

Perfection is the enemy of the good. Some of these projects worked out better than others, some I took more time over, but it's immensely satisfying to complete a string of bunting and decorate your house.

Attaching the bunting

- Face the fronts. The placement of backing fabric is important. When you sew a piece of backing fabric on to a triangle you should face the printed front of your fabric on to the front of another printed piece (for double sided bunting) or on to the front of your backing fabric.
- Hem up the two long sides of the triangle. Leave the top piece open so you can turn the triangle inside out. You will then have any loose threads and the edge of the hem inside, and the design on the outside.
- Sew the binding across the top and seal the final triangle as you go. This is the lazy way of doing it and saves a lot of time. It wasn't possible with the pizza bunting design where the top was folded over and sewn around a stuffing piece.
- Break the project down into three stages. Cut out triangles, sew up triangles, sew triangles on to binding.
- Trim can be done before or after. You can always work on the same piece across more than one year to fully realise your vision.
- You should really iron your bunting for crisp edges, but a lot of creasing can be avoided by storing it flat.

Even more design ideas

- · Cake slices are triangles. So are slices of pie.
- What if your bunting wasn't triangles? You could make leaves or stars or snowflakes.
- Working with kids? They could each draw on their own triangles with fabric paint, and sew or glue on buttons, letters or felt shapes. Make it match by giving them a theme like a white snowman on a green background, or by giving them stars and moons and a black background.
- Shields with their own heraldry would make a cool class project. You could attach each shield
 to bunting with safety pins instead of sewing on so the children can take their own home at the
 end of term. (Any leftovers become yours and after running the project a few times you'll have a
 permanent string in your classroom.)
- My gauze triangles in the sugar skull string are floaty and mysterious. You could make a string of fairy bunting in pastel gauzes, or flame bunting in red and orange net.
- Elemental bunting would be excellent. Earth, air, fire and water. How would you make this?
- You can make birthday banners with a person's name spelled out across one string and Happy Birthday across another.
- Quilted bunting would be impressive.
- Appliquéd or iron-on patches could work as fun additions and would be quite simple to do, creating a sticker or graffiti effect.
- Create a theme for a nursery or kids' bedroom. Animals, football, magic, space, there are so many great ways to make this look fantastic.
